What is Digital Technology?

- Digital technology means electronic tools, devices, systems, and resources organizations utilize as they process or store data and complete many other functions, increasing **productivity and efficiency**. Examples include digital cameras, personal computers, smartphones, software applications, the internet, and emerging technologies such as artificial intelligence, machine learning, and blockchain and all devices that utilize increasingly fast data transmission speeds and that store or process data using digital signals.
- One example of technologies businesses use to utilize tools is cloud platforms, such as **Microsoft 365** or **Google Docs**, that users can utilize on mobile phones. The reason for using digital technology is that it speeds up processes, allowing staff to focus on higher-level functions that technology cannot handle.

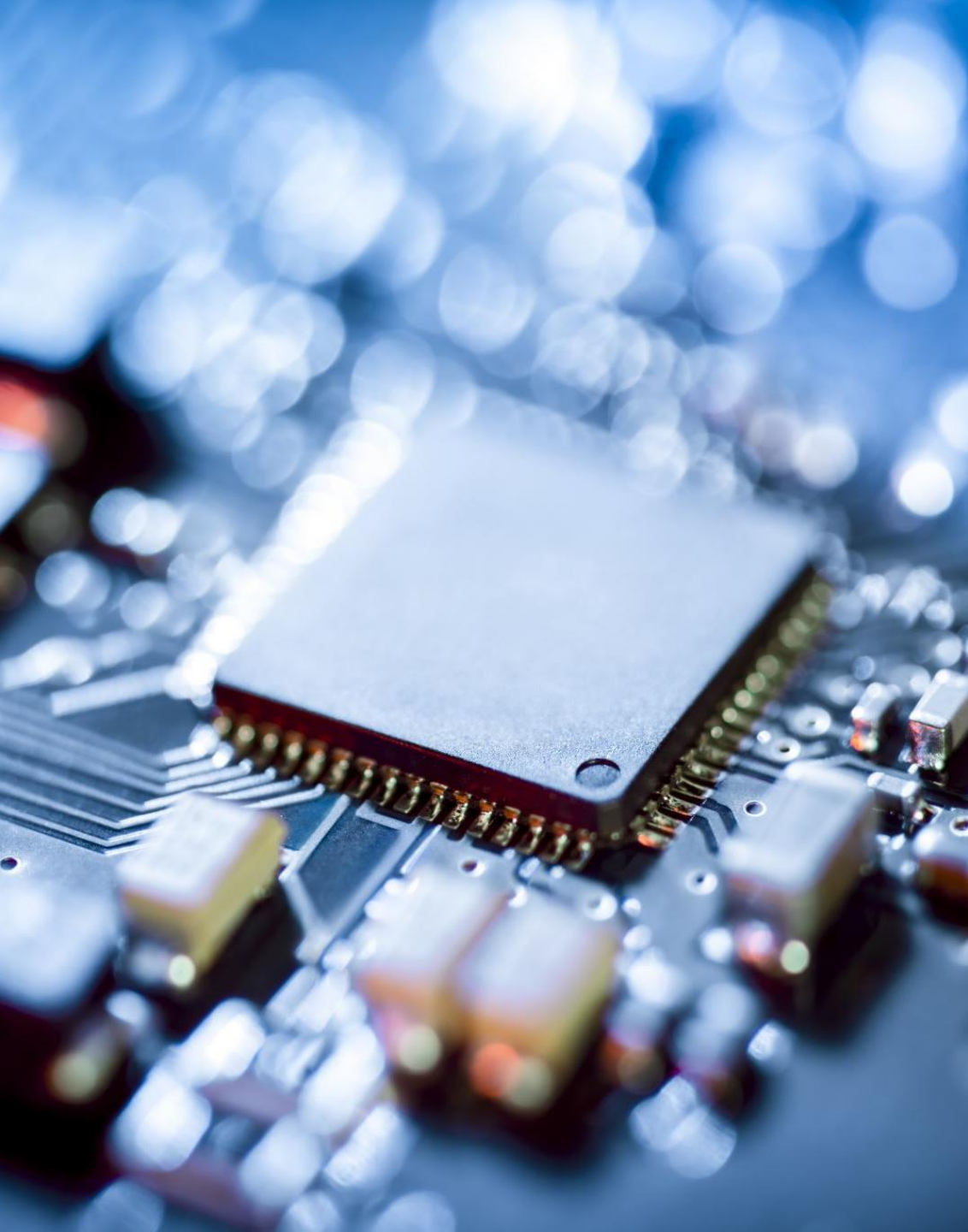

Hardware: Computers, Smartphones, and Other Devices

Definition

Hardware refers to the physical components of a computer system and other digital devices. Hardware serves as the backbone of digital technology, providing the necessary infrastructure to run software and process data.

Computers

- **Types of Computers:** Computers come in various forms, including desktops, laptops, servers, and supercomputers. Each type is designed for specific tasks, with desktops and laptops being common for personal use, while servers and supercomputers handle large-scale processing for businesses, research, and data-intensive applications.

The motherboard connects all these components, allowing them to communicate and function together.



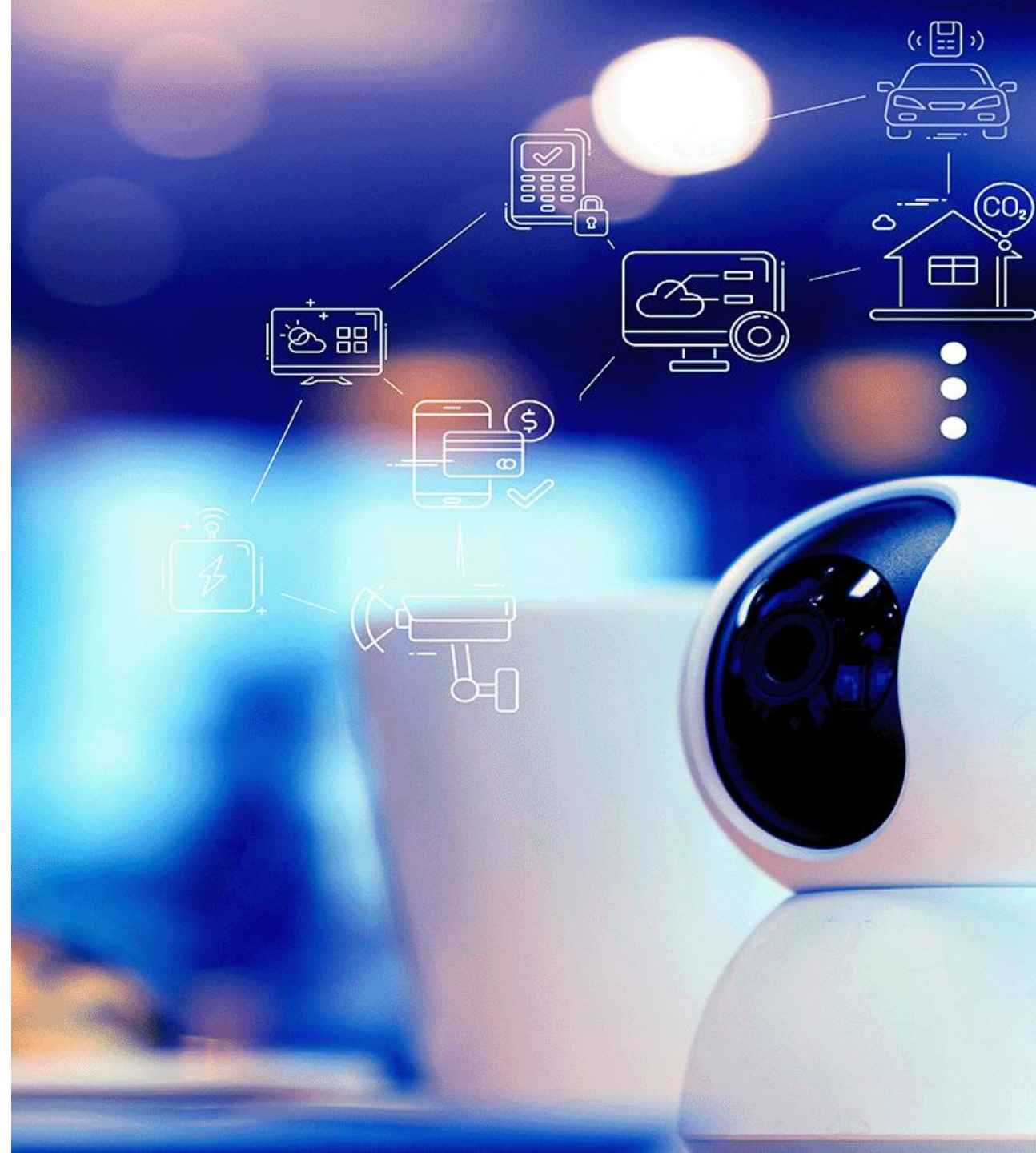
Smartphones

Software: Operating Systems, Applications, and Tools

Software is what brings hardware to life, enabling it to perform specific tasks and provide functionality to users.

Operating Systems

- **Role of Operating Systems:** An operating system (OS) is the software that manages the hardware and software resources of a computer or device. It provides a user interface, manages files and applications, and controls peripheral devices.
- **Types of Operating Systems:** There are various types of operating systems, including:
 - **Desktop OS:** Examples include Microsoft Windows, macOS, and Linux. These are designed for personal computers and laptops.
 - **Mobile OS:** Examples include Android and iOS. These are optimized for smartphones and tablets.
 - **Server OS:** Examples include Windows Server, Linux Server distributions, and UNIX. These are designed to manage network resources and provide services to other computers on the network.



Applications

Tools and Utilities

Definition

The Internet

- **Global Network:** The internet is a global network of interconnected computers and servers that communicate using standardized protocols. It provides access to a vast array of information, services, and applications.
- **Key Components:** The internet relies on technologies like TCP/IP (Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol), DNS (Domain Name System), and HTTP/HTTPS (Hypertext Transfer Protocol) to function. Data is transmitted across the internet in packets, which are routed through various network nodes to reach their destination.
- **Services:** The internet supports a wide range of services, including web browsing, email, file transfer, and streaming media. It also enables social media, online gaming, and e-commerce.

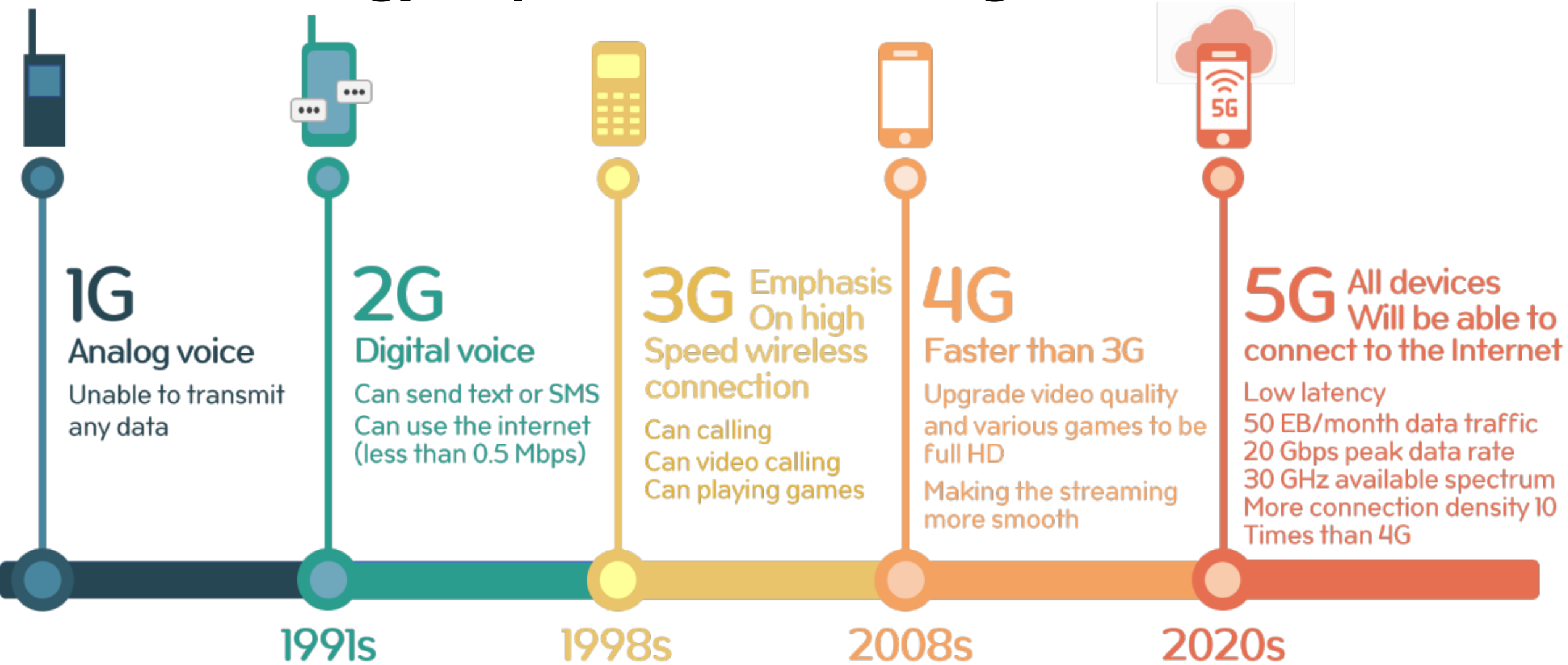


Wi-Fi and Wireless Networks

- **Wi-Fi Technology:** Wi-Fi is a wireless networking technology that allows devices to connect to a local area network (LAN) using radio waves. It is widely used in homes, businesses, and public spaces to provide internet access without the need for physical cables.
- **Mobile Networks:** Mobile networks, including 3G, 4G, and 5G, provide wireless communication over large geographic areas. These networks support mobile internet access, voice calls, and messaging services.
- **Bluetooth and Other Wireless Technologies:** Bluetooth is used for short-range wireless communication between devices, such as connecting headphones to a smartphone. Other technologies, like NFC (Near Field Communication), enable contactless payments and data exchange.

With this we can understand that all technologies represent a generation of users.

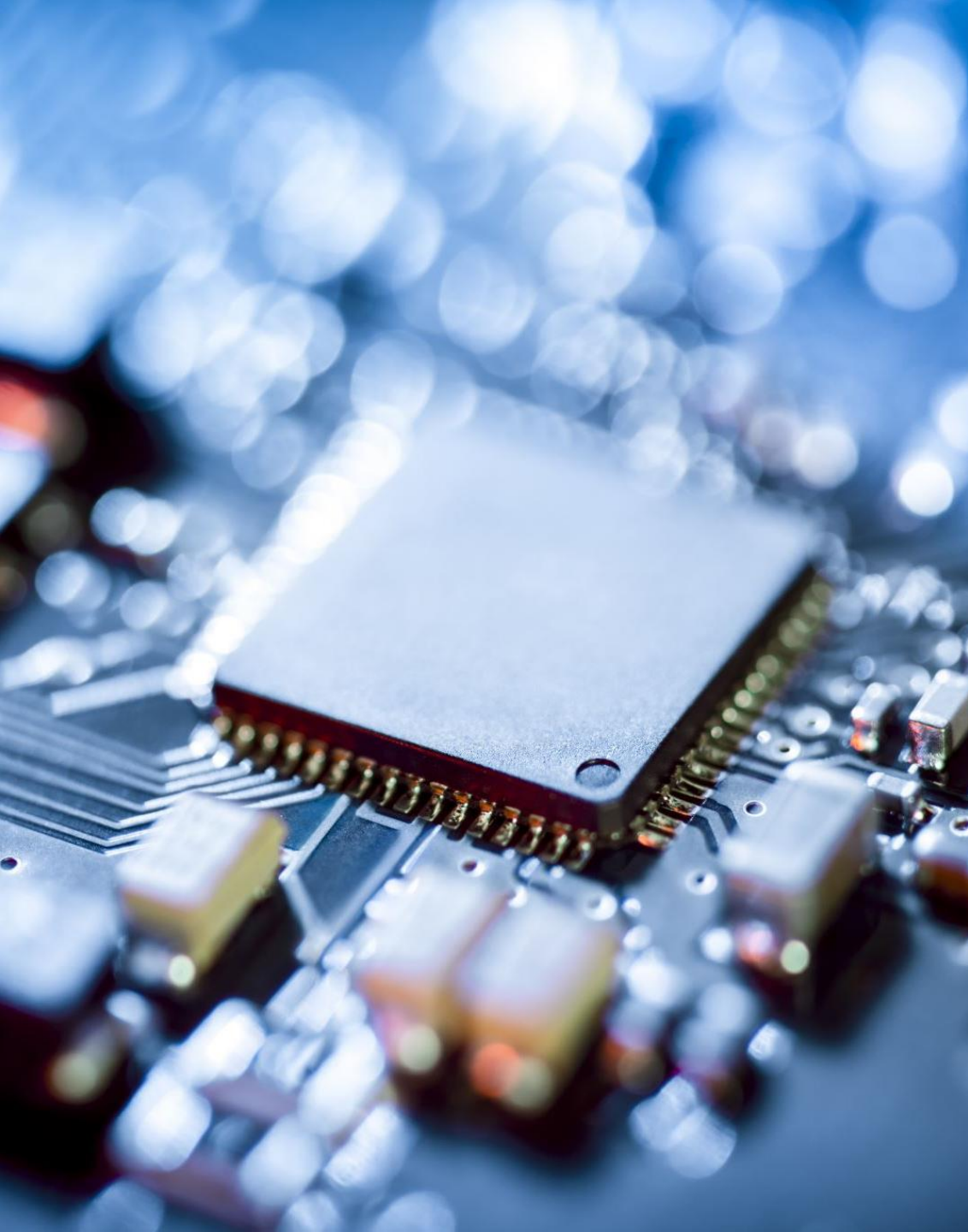
Data Communication

Data: Big Data, Databases, and Cloud Computing

Definition

Big Data

- **Characteristics of Big Data:** Big data refers to extremely large datasets that are too complex to be handled by traditional data processing tools. These datasets are characterized by the three Vs: Volume (large size), Velocity (high speed of generation), and Variety (different types and formats).
- **Applications:** Big data is used in various fields, including healthcare, finance, marketing, and scientific research. It enables organizations to analyze trends, predict outcomes, and personalize services.
- **Challenges:** Managing big data requires specialized tools and techniques, such as Hadoop and Spark, to store, process, and analyze large datasets efficiently. Privacy and security are also major concerns in big data applications.



The six Vs of big data

Big data is a collection of data from various sources, often characterized by what's become known as the 3Vs: *volume*, *variety* and *velocity*. Over time, other Vs have been added to descriptions of big data:

Databases

- **Types of Databases:** Databases are structured collections of data that can be easily accessed, managed, and updated. Common types of databases include:
 - **Relational Databases:** Such as MySQL, Oracle, and PostgreSQL, which organize data into tables with rows and columns.
 - **NoSQL Databases:** Such as MongoDB and Cassandra, which store data in formats other than relational tables, making them suitable for unstructured or semi-structured data.
 - **In-Memory Databases:** Such as Redis, which store data in the memory (RAM) of the server, allowing for faster access times.
- **Database Management Systems (DBMS):** DBMS software, such as Microsoft SQL Server or Oracle DBMS, provides tools for creating, querying, and managing databases. They support data integrity, security, and backup processes.



Cloud Computing

- **Definition and Models:** Cloud computing refers to the delivery of computing services (such as servers, storage, databases, networking, software) over the internet ("the cloud"). There are several models of cloud computing:
 - **Infrastructure as a Service (IaaS):** Provides virtualized computing resources over the internet, such as Amazon Web Services (AWS) and Microsoft Azure.
 - **Platform as a Service (PaaS):** Offers a platform that allows developers to build, deploy, and manage applications without worrying about underlying infrastructure.
 - **Software as a Service (SaaS):** Delivers software applications over the internet on a subscription basis, such as Google Workspace and Salesforce.
- **Advantages of Cloud Computing:** Cloud computing offers flexibility, scalability, and cost-efficiency. It enables businesses to scale their IT resources up or down based on demand, reduces the need for on-premises infrastructure, and supports remote work.
- **Security and Compliance:** While cloud computing offers numerous benefits, it also raises concerns about data security, privacy, and compliance with regulations. Cloud providers invest heavily in security measures, but organizations must also implement their own security practices.
